When he arrived he saw the children playing in his garden. 'What are you doing here?' he cried in a very gruff voice, and the children ran away. 'My own garden is my own garden,' said the Giant. 'Anyone can understand that and I will allow nobody to play in it but myself.' So he built a high wall all round it, and put up a notice: <u>TRESPASSERS</u> WILL BE EATEN. He was a very **selfish** Giant.


